

# 2020 IMPACT REPORT



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It would be difficult to think back on 2020 without acknowledging the many challenges we have all faced as a community. The pain of those who have lost loved ones, or who were unable to comfort family members in hospitals. The anxiety of many who have been forced into isolation, and the uncertainty of the long-term impact on our health, economy, and our children.

Yet through all of these hardships, the Allegheny County Library Association (ACLA) and its Member Libraries have provided a small ray of hope through many of these trials. Even when their doors closed last March, libraries continued to serve the community by offering a full range of virtual programming for all ages, online and phone reference support, and access to free Wi-Fi from sidewalks and parking lots.

Library staff members went above and beyond their call by checking in on older patrons and reaching out to community partners to help deliver books and other materials to local residents.

Allegheny County libraries' eLibrary provided access to electronic books, magazines, music, and videos. Gradually, libraries reopened their doors. Curbside service allowed for the return of "real books" and Grab & Go bags which provided screen-free activities for kids and families.

All of this required careful planning and extensive safety measures – and additional cost. ACLA and its Member Libraires were able to access several emergency funding opportunities.

Twenty-nine libraries applied for and received Payroll Protection Program loans in 2020. Allegheny County provided CARES Act funding to replace lost revenue from the Allegheny Regional Asset District. Several libraries received funding through the Pennsylvania Humanities Council for services to at-risk populations. There were opportunities to purchase Personal Protective Equipment as a consortium with reimbursement through State funds.

Most important, we are grateful to the many individuals who donated to their local library during the Love Your Library campaign in September and to the Jack Buncher Foundation in providing matching funds for this event for the fifth year in a row.

All of that said, the road ahead remains uncertain financially. Local governments are struggling, which will impact on their ability to fund library services in 2021. The State has been able to maintain level funding for libraries, despite facing its own budgetary challenges. And finally, it remains unclear when sales tax revenue that supports regional assets (including libraries) will recover fully.

Keeping libraries strong will be a shared responsibility. We welcome your voice of support in accomplishing that mission and ask that you continue to speak out about the value of your library to local and state elected officials.

Libraries have been serving Allegheny County's communities for more than 130 years. We're only just getting started on the next 130!

The **511,852 cardholders** had free access to **46 libraries and more than 70 locations**,




# Serving our youth

Allegheny County Library Association's Youth Services programs continue to play a critical role in the development of children throughout the County. The year 2020 included a series of virtual learning programs. Each one was developed to allow students and family members to participate in several engaging educational adventures.

These programs would not be possible without a host of dedicated partners who collaborated to provide a series of educational and entertaining resources. ACLA is thankful for our partnerships with these organizations: Allegheny County Parks, Allegheny Land Trust, Andy Warhol Museum, Children's Hospital of Pittsburgh, Children's Museum of Pittsburgh, Common Sense Media, Heinz History Center, KDKA-TV, Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre, Pittsburgh Botanic Garden, Pittsburgh Symphony Orchestra, Spark Books, Western Pennsylvania Conservancy, WQED Education.

The Skins & Skulls program, led by the Allegheny County Park Ranger, was the most viewed partner-led program of the summer with 1,246 views. The program also had the most engaged users with 138 reactions.

In 2020, ACLA Youth Services itself enacted **55 programs** which included nearly **1,500 participants**.



# On the road with resources

## In total, Mobile Services conducted 342 curbside visits, representing 403 hours of service, while traveling 10,834 miles.

ACLA's Mobile Library Services program had its own set of challenges during 2020. However, being "mobile" allowed the program to adapt and bring the resources to the people in innovative ways.

The bookmobiles conducted their usual routes through March 14 until health orders and restrictions were put in place. During that period, Mobile Services conducted 268 visits and 130 preschool programs, representing 230 hours of on-site service across the three routes.

Beginning in late March, Mobile Services initiated virtual programming. From late March through the end of the year, 82 story times were conducted on Zoom and YouTube with a total of 1,585 views.

As of June 16, curbside services resumed to various facilities and locations.

The bookmobiles served more than 100 sites across 47 municipalities. The stops included 49 preschool locations with 60 classrooms, 46 senior sites, 1 adult daycare and 5 community (fee-based) sites serving our underserved and hard to reach audiences.

# The love keeps growing



Residents of Allegheny County recognize libraries as critical to the social fabric of their communities and have demonstrated this with their continued support, even in these challenging times. Despite the pandemic, the fifth annual **Love Your Library campaign** moved full speed ahead during the month of September.

Unable to hold long-planned, in-person fundraising events, libraries came up with new and innovative fundraising activities. Some events were overhauled and presented virtually, with libraries reporting that this model allowed them to engage new audiences. Many libraries refocused on direct appeals to patrons by including donation envelopes in curbside library services, which proved to be very successful.

Last September, our 46 libraries raised over \$1.1 million for the Love Your Library campaign - more than in any previous year. Of this amount, \$678,520 was eligible for a prorated match, courtesy of the Jack Buncher Foundation.

The ACLA Board of Directors and staff, along with the boards and staff of our 46 Member Libraries are grateful to the Jack Buncher Foundation for its continued support.

This year, **7,562 donors** participated in the Love Your Library campaign, a nearly **6% increase** over last year. Notably, this year we saw a

47% increase in new donors, with 1,949 new participants.

# Progress amidst the pandemic

While ACLA and our Member Libraries experienced many changes to our operations in 2020, we continued to make progress on our primary goals:

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## Promote the value of library service through advocacy, public relations, and communications.

- Participated with the Complete Count Committee to administer the 2020 Census.
- Assisted libraries in communicating new statewide voting options.
- Hosted virtual meetings with state elected officials.
- Shared media updates on the status of library services throughout the pandemic.
- Co-sponsored the fifth Love Your Library campaign.



## Strengthen library boards and staff through professional and resource development.

- Hosted virtual training on basic board governance, building compensation systems, and succession planning.
- Hosted open forum discussions to assist libraries in navigating the pandemic.
- Provided training to youth services for certification in early education.
- Expanded pilot partnerships between libraries and social workers.
- Planned for 2021 launch of The Talent Bank, to recruit community volunteers for library boards and committees.

### Support collaboration and resource sharing.

- Supported libraries in removing barriers to access (fine-free pilot).
- Promoted online registration for library cards.
- Coordinated a Community Technology Needs Assessment.
- Shared resources to address library challenges during the pandemic.
  - Offered online training and meeting platforms to encourage participation.
    - Hosted virtual programming with cultural assets to augment summer learning.
